Nursery

Reception







If you happened to pass the Reception playground over the last couple of weeks, you'll know that the children have been enjoying the traditional tale 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff'. There has been bridge building, trip trapping goats and fearsome trolls shouting 'Who's that trip trapping over my bridge!'

Our 'What a Performance' topic began by practising circus skills in the sunshine and, since then, the children have been busy selling tickets in our box office role-play areas for all sorts of performances including re-telling the story of the 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' with story spoons. The children are enjoying using different voices for each of the Billy Goats and the Troll. We are expecting some magnificent performances in our first class assemblies at the end of this half term...

Year I



There was great excitement on the first day of term when the Year I classrooms were taken over by amazing architects. The children worked together to explore a range of materials to construct strong and stable houses for the Three Little Pigs from a

range of materials. They showed great creativity making marvelous structures from newspaper, boxes, straws and even toilet rolls. Then came the ultimate challenge: were the houses strong enough to withstand the Big Bad Wolf's huff and puff test? It was a nail-biting moment, but we're pleased to say the Three Little Pigs (and their houses) just about withstood the wolf's best efforts.

Year 2



Year 2's new topic, 'Growing Up', is based around the growth and life cycles of plants and animals (including humans). To start things off, we thought about what plants need to grow before planting seeds to grow edible plants. We also planted salad seeds at the allotment, which we will nurture during our forest school sessions. At the end of term, we will harvest what we have grown to make a salad!

Year 3

In our topic From Source to Sea, the children have been learning about different styles of poetry by reading poems aloud and writing their own. They have also begun crafting highly detailed and ultra-realistic papier mache models of river systems; and will soon be making rain in a jar as they study states of matter and the water cycle.

My waters became wide and deep at last As I flowed under London Bridge. I passed people on the beach As I was at the edge.


> I was grown at last And met the estuary. Now I am part of The big blue sea.

Year 4




Year 4 have been busy cowering under their desks to the sound of air raid sirens, while exploring our new topic, Away from Home. This half term they are investigating the experiences of London children during World War 2. They have listened to Neville Chamberlain announce the start of the war, watched original news reports, studied old photos, met an Air Raid Warden over Zoom (thanks to the RAF Museum), written our own id labels to tie around our necks and packed imaginary suitcases for our evacuation to the countryside. It's been interesting comparing what children went through then, to what we've been through over the last 12 months, and to see how resilient wartime children had to be too.

Most fun has been designing our own Anderson shelters and testing them to see if they would withstand a German bomb. Julia's Lego version is well and truly bomb proof!



Year 5



The children in year 5 have been enjoying their new topic, 'Benin - an African Kingdom', discovering where the kingdom was located and learning about the countries that make up the continent of Africa today. They have also been researching what life was like for the people who lived during the time when Benin played a major role in the history of the continent. This research will ultimately lead to each group producing their own group book all about the amazing kingdom of Benin. Something to look forward to!

Year 6



Year 6 have travelled over 2000 years back in time and across the world to China to the reign of the First Emperor who ruled from 221 to 210 BC. They have discovered that he achieved many amazing things, but his people suffered greatly as a result. Building our own version of the Great Wall of China on our In Day prompted us to draw parallels with other border walls built to keep unwanted peoples out, such as Hadrian's Wall, the Berlin Wall, the US-Mexico Border walls and others. In the coming weeks, they are looking forward to finding out why the First Emperor was obsessed with immortality and investigating his elaborate tomb guarded by the famous Terracotta Warriors.
