In the gentle rhythm of early autumn, our Little Artists explored mark-making techniques with care and curiosity. Gathering favourite objects from the playground, they translated their discoveries into visual notes — drawing from observation, guided by the textures of leaves, twigs, and earth, and the feel of new materials in their hands.

















THE WORLD THROUGH OUR SENSES_ YEAR 1

Inspired by the land artist Andy Goldsworthy, Year 1 became nature's collaborators. In the Peace Garden Pond, they created a shared sculpture — "The Two Islands", a name created by Leo in Blanche Nevile. Made from natural resources gathered around the school grounds, the ephemeral artwork invites us to take a moment and enjoy — for like a leaf in the wind, it won't be here long!





















THE ANIMAL KINGDOM_ YEAR 2

In a playful exploration of pattern and disguise, Year 2 created animal camouflage prints. With observant eyes and lively mark-making, they mimicked the wild.

FROM PALAENTOLOGY TO ARCHAEOLOGY_ YEAR 3

This term, dinosaurs ruled the Art Room! In a hands on sculpting session, Year 3 explored the principles of volume and balance — discovering just how tricky it is to keep a dinosaur on its feet.

From Parasaurolophus to Stegosaurus, and the mighty Triceratops, each creature came to life in bold, unexpected colours— what wonderful yet monstrous lizards they were.



















MASK AND MINOTAURS_YEAR 4

Channelling the myths of ancient Greece, Year 4 crafted story-filled tiles using terracotta clay. Inspired by the creativity of Greek pottery, they etched their ideas using sgraffito — a magical technique where grey slip reveals the clay beneath.



















A VICTORIAN EDUCATION_ YEAR 5

Acquiring William Morris' heritage of beauty and natural designs, Year 5 shaped the style in a linoprinting masterclass. From sketches and carving to printing. a productive session where some children had the opportunity to apply a second colour.




PENDARREN_ YEAR 6




